### From the Rector

#### Archdeacon Brett Watterson

A big thank you to all who have contributed to this edition of the Trinity Times, it has been a long time between prints!

A lot has taken place in the life of the parish and the diocese over the last few years. Bishop Ian and Liz, who have been residing in St Frances House-adjacent to the church, recently announced Ian's retirement in April 2019. Whilst both Ian and Liz have been in and out of Dubbo due to ministry or family commitments, Dubbo has been their home since 2013.

Bishop Ian lays up his pastoral staff at a service in All Saint's Cathedral, Bathurst 11am Saturday 27 April 2019. He and Liz will take some hard-earnt long service leave before returning briefly to Dubbo, later in the year, to bid farewell to the parish.

In October I was the Vicar General, as Bishop Ian and Liz were overseas, representing the Primate at the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Diocese and assisting in taking Cursillo (a Christian short course) to Hong Kong. They also had some time with family in the UK. The Reverend Robert Bowman, a retired priest from Coonamble, assisted with other members of the ministry team during this time. His presence and contribution to the life of the parish was greatly appreciated.

Also joining the ministry team, commissioned on the First Sunday of Advent, is the Reverend Cathy Walker, who with her husband Peter recently moved from Bateau Bay to Dubbo. We warmly welcome them both to Dubbo! Cathy will minister as a Chaplain at Kintyre and assist in other ways in the parish as an Honorary Assistant Priest.

I am pleased to report that following on from the meeting of our Synod in September and the Diocese of Sydney Synod in October, it has been agreed that the Sydney Diocese will support our Diocese financially over the next six (6) years. This support has been sought because of the financial drain on the Diocese that has resulted from the court case and other costs-such as redress, thus making the sustaining of a bishop unattainable. The assistance will reduce the monthly contributions made to the diocese by the parishes, allowing more money to be put toward ministry and mission locally.

In November a small group of our Dubbo Ministry Team attended a Diocesan Training day at Orange which focused on moving from Ministry to Mission. The teaching looked at the life of Jesus in order to better understand what and how we can better engage in God's mission here on earth. In the New Year we will take time to think and pray of how we can put this into action in Dubbo!

As we prepare to celebrate Christmas and begin a New Year, we can do so with great confidence because we know that God is in control!

This year has had many ups and downs-the drought has been terrible, but Christmas is a powerful reminder that God is with us. Jesus, came in the form of a child, died as a man, was raised to new life and now sits at the right hand of God! May we not lose hope, but rather, may we grow in the Hope, Faith, Joy, Peace and Love of Christ!

On behalf of my family, the parish council and ministry team, I bid you a most holy and blessed Christmas and New Year,

## *Our Parish in Mission*

It has been said that “the church that lives by itself will die by itself”. Mission is fundamental to our life as Christians, both as individuals and as a faith community. In the past year Dubbo Parish has committed itself to the growth of the Kingdom in several ways. We have raised funds for mission work through the monthly allocated giving of those who helpfully continue with the Planned Giving Program through offertory envelopes. Some parishioners have small, but important, fundraising initiatives, such as the making and sale of greeting cards, and the sale of home-made produce like lemon butter, jams and pickles. But, as a parish, we’ve also had seasons of giving for particular missions, underwritten by direct appeal and special fellowship events. Our main targets have been these:



### **BCA (Bush Church Aid)**

BCA ministries are close to the heart of many parishioners who have lived on the land and experienced life in small and remote communities. This year we have been blessed by

having Rev Neville Naden based in our Parish offices, on BCA duties across Australia, supporting ministry initiatives in indigenous communities. It’s a scattered and varied work that takes him away from Dubbo often. So, through our financial support of BCA we, not only help Neville’s kingdom ministry to advance, but we have the benefit from time to time of his insightful and caring fellowship.

### **ABM (Anglican Board of Mission)**

ABM has long been a traditional area of mission support for Dubbo Anglicans,

### **CGS (Company of the Good Shepherd)**



Dubbo Parish has been partner with Good Shepherd ministries from the outset, with the formation of the Brotherhood of the Good Shepherd in 1903 and in more recent years through the current ministry of the Company of the Good Shepherd serving north-western NSW outlying parishes. One supported parish is Bourke. Holy Trinity is blessed to be the venue for the ordination to the priesthood of Rev John Gaff who, with his wife Dee, has been serving in Bourke in recent years. For some years

they were parishioners among us in Dubbo. What a thrill once again to have an ordained Anglican priest in that outlying centre of the Diocese! Our Parish offices also house the wonderful Heritage Centre preserving some of the ministry archives and memorabilia of the pioneering work of the Brotherhood of the Good Shepherd.



## CMS (Church Missionary Society)


Late in 2017 the Parish entered into a partnership agreement with CMS to be a Link Church for Rev Kevin and Karen Flanagan to serve in the Anglican Diocese of Lake Rukwa in Tanzania. They left for their mission field in January of this year, spent four months in Morogoro beginning their Swahili language learning, then moved to their final location in the remote town of Mpanda in the far west of Tanzania. Kevin is assigned the task of helping Bishop Mathayo Kasagara to strengthen the theological understanding of the dispersed diocesan rural clergy. Karen is keen to build partnership with women in the Diocese, especially the clergy wives. With only the beginnings of Swahili understanding, and with very limited access to anyone with understanding of English, they are embarked on a challenging faith ministry.

So parishioners have made significant financial contribution to mission work. Of course, the prayers of parishioners and their contact with those in the field are a vital part of our mission ministry. And then there is our own missionary service closer to home as we serve out in the community of Dubbo, through service to the many clients of the Op Shop, and through our encounters with others visiting or serving in our Parish Family. Rev Gloria Shipp leads a very important community mission work through the weekly meetings and fellowship of Aboriginal Elders. We all have a part to play; let's look forward to where the Spirit will lead us in 2019!



## Bishop Ian and Liz in Hong Kong


In October Liz and I were in Hong Kong for almost a fortnight. We were guests of the Archbishop, The Most Rev'd Dr Paul Kwong, representing our Primate at the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Foundation of the Province of Hong Kong Sheng Kung Hui. Our Primate gave me the book *"Our Mob, God's Story"* to present to The Archbishop. This beautiful "Coffee Table Book" is published by the Bible Society. This fitting Australian gift contains art work and stories speaking of the Christian faith in the lives of believers and the culture and traditions of the First Peoples of Australia.



On Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> October we attended a Thanksgiving Eucharist for 3,500 people. Liz, with Lew and Sylvia Hitchick found themselves seated on the front row! Archbishop Josiah Idowu-Fearon the Secretary General of the Anglican Consultative Council preached a challenging sermon on "Abiding in Christ". The Eucharist was followed by a Chinese Banquet for 2,500 guests and people. Altogether it was an awesome occasion.

On Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> October I was privileged to be invited to preach in the Cathedral at their annual service for the Blessing of Pets in remembrance of St Francis of Assisi. There were more than 300 people in the congregation and lots of animals.


The main reason for going to Hong Kong at this time was that Cursillo Australia had been invited to "gift" Cursillo to the Province of Hong Kong Sheng Kung Hui. Thirteen Australians agreed to come on team. Both Liz and I were part of this team. I, as the National Episcopal Advisor to Cursillo Australia, was a Spiritual Advisor to the team and Liz as the Musician to the Cursillo.



In prayer we had agreed the theme, *"Fan into Flame the Gift that God has given you"* from St Paul's opening of his 2<sup>nd</sup> Letter to Timothy.



We gathered at a Retreat House on the island of Cheng Chau. Fr Will Newman and Fr Robert Martin from Hong Kong (both having done Cursillo) joined the team and in the end 15 lay people came as participants. Right from the start we were deeply conscious of the Spirit of God moving amongst us.



Cursillo had been invited to Hong Kong because, while there are many services that attract hundreds of worshippers, and the Cathedral is engaged in many activities, the leadership saw the need for building community in Christ and people being renewed in their faith.

Since we left, the Cursillistas in Hong Kong have continued to meet for fellowship and mutual encouragement. They have agreed to organise Hong Kong #2 Cursillo to be held on the first weekend in October next year. I suspect that some people from Australia will be going to support and encourage them.

On Monday 24<sup>th</sup> September a group of 18 Torres Strait Islanders, (both adults and youth) from Bamaga arrived in Dubbo during the afternoon after a long day of travel. They were joined by the Reverend Lenore Parker from Grafton Diocese. On Monday evening they had dinner with members from Dubbo Anglican church the hall before having an early night in preparation of the week ahead.

Tuesday the group arrived at Dubbo Anglican church hall in the morning and spent time with the Elders group and Delroy Cam-



pus Aboriginal Girls Circle. After this they were at the Reconciliation luncheon in the hall, where we had the largest crowd in years. The group shared their story, sang songs of praise as well as cultural songs and danced for the attendees. A lot of positive feedback was received on the day and afterwards regarding the Bamaga group.

After the luncheon some of the group joined in a meeting with both clergy and lay ministers from Bathurst Diocese who have formed a working group whose aim is to research, produce and make information available to the Bishop in Council, Synod, diocese and beyond to assist in the better understanding and incorporation of Indigenous Culture with-in the life of the church. Dinner was in the hall again with members from the Dubbo Anglican Church Ministry Council. On Wednesday they travelled to Taronga Western Plains Zoo for an early morning zoo walk behind the scenes, looking at the night areas, followed by breakfast and a visit to the education centre, participating in cultural activities. They were hosted at the zoo by Aboriginal workers. Lunch was held in the church hall and Rose Elu from Brisbane arrived to spend the remainder of the week with them. In the afternoon some of the adults went out to Orana Juvenile Justice Centre. The group spoke with the boys, sang and shared their culture and love of Christ. The boys enjoyed having them out there. During this time the remainder of the group had a short tour around Dubbo and free time.

Dinner was again at the church hall with members from the community and church joining us. Once again there was singing and dancing and sharing of stories and prayer. The kids were entertained with making slime, which they loved. Reverend Lenore Parker said goodbye to the group on Wednesday night to travel back to Grafton on Thursday morning.

On Thursday the group joined in NAIDOC celebrations with students, staff and community members at Dubbo South High Campus. They spent most of the day here speaking with students and staff and teaching students some of the dances. The day was a great celebration of culture.

On Thursday night they were joined by some of the Elders, Rev Neville Naden from BCA and Kevin Slabb who teaches at Wontulp Bi-Buyu for dinner at Sporties Club. After dinner speeches were made and Kevin spoke to the youth, encouraging them to keep strong in their faith and encouraging them to study at Wontulp Bi-Buyu. The night finished with singing and prayer.

On Friday morning the group departed Dubbo to travel back home. Rose Elu attended the Friday morning service at Dubbo Anglican church and spoke on reconciliation and shared stories of her life and faith.

This visit was a great experience for both the Bamaga and Dubbo people, to share their culture and faith with each other. Many people have expressed a wish to have the group visit again for a longer period and visit more schools and groups in the future.

## **BGS/CGS HERITAGE CENTRE.**

It is now just over twelve months since the Brotherhood and the Company of the Good Shepherd opened the Heritage Centre for both organisations.

The Heritage Centre is located in rooms at the rear of Brotherhood House

.Both organisations have been or are involved in supporting ministry in the north-western areas of the Diocese.

The Centre has three aims.

1. To provide a place for the collection of the records, artefacts and memorabilia of both organisations.
2. To encourage people to become companions of the organisation.
3. To encourage individuals and groups to donate funds for the work of the Company.

The BGS has received a grant through Dubbo Regional Council towards the digitising of records. The project has a total cost of \$18 000+

Recently the Parish Council made a further room available to add to the Heritage centre. This was the old laundry and work has started to create an opening between this room and the old bathroom, the floor will have to be raised and some painting done.

When finished it will be known as the Hudson/Briers room and feature displays relevant to them. It will also become the video room with a screen and computer,

The old bathroom will be revamped and called the Hudson/White room also with relevant displays. It is planned to have the work completed by February 2019. The opening and dedication is to place at the 2019 Annual Meeting of BGS on 21<sup>st</sup> March 2019.



## **Brotherhood Clock returns home.**

Following the Bush Brothers ceasing to occupy Brotherhood House in 1980, the Board of BGS in 1993 auctioned all the Chapel, dining room and lounge room furniture and artefacts. Amongst the items auctioned was the clock.



The clock was purchased by Kevin Walsh who was an avid collector of clocks.

Kevin passed away in October 2017.

Recently his widow Margaret Walsh generously donated the clock to the Brotherhood for display in the Heritage centre.

*Our operation is one of transparency, every item that we purchase from Australian charities is sent overseas, we containerise all stock received and ship to our processing plant in Dubai, all stock is then processed and shipped to our three African warehouses located in Madagascar, Mozambique and Kenya.  
All stock then is used for our commercial and charitable interests in those particular countries.*

## **WHOLESALE WAREHOUSES**

*One Ten Enterprises have a total 3 Wholesale Warehouses in Mozambique (main Warehouse), Madagascar and Kenya.*

*One Ten Enterprises employs a total of 214 African Nationals.*

*One Ten Enterprises once again provides a safe working environment including meals and above award wages. The end product is sold to local wholesale merchants as well as meeting One Ten Enterprises social welfare commitments.*
